

Overall Project Goal

To improve access to sustainable Children's Palliative Care (CPC) services in Kenya for children with cancer and other PC needs.



STRATEGY

 The project work will align with the WHO Global Initiative for Childhood Cancer, increasing access, advancing quality, saving lives (WHO Cure All Framework), national cancer strategic plan 2023-2028 and PC policy



Objective 1

• Improved skills, knowledge and confidence in CPC through training and availability of resources on CPC for HCP.

- Establish a CPC Centre of Learning (CPCCL) central repository and hub to support the development and improved access to CPC services across the country
- ➤ HCPs linked together over the three years and will continue to be engaged and supported through online training, mentorship and contextually appropriate resources to sustain their interest, growth and support of CPC

Objective 2

• Policy gap analysis and roadmap developed in partnership with the MoH to create supportive policies and regulation of CPC.

- > Human rights approach evidence base
- ➤ Influencing policy and national programming for CPC



Objective 3

- New public conversation due to increased public health awareness of CPC through behavior change communication (BCC) interventions.
- ➤ addressing myths and misconception of paediatric oncology and CPC while encouraging early diagnosis and care

- Jun 2024 Completion of self-paced online CPC course work by HCPs
- Sept 2024 Policy gap analysis completed in collaboration with MoH
- Dec 2024 BCC programming strategy completed
- Jun 2025 Completion of intensive one-year CPC training program along with mentorship structure & gap analysis report dissemination completed
- Dec 2025 Implementation framework for MoH engagement published
 & disseminated BCC programming
